### Another Year of the Friends

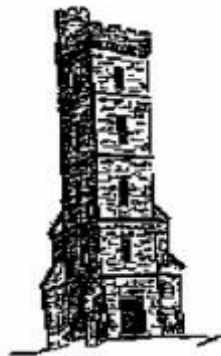

## Bird Survey

The Edinburgh Wildlife Explorers, a group of children from 6 to 12 years old, conduct a bird census on Corstorphine Hill during the spring and early summer. They have been surveying Corstorphine Hill since 2000 at the request of the City of Edinburgh Ranger Service, who were keen to build contacts with local wild life groups, because no surveys had been conducted during the previous five years.

The group, led by Keith Donnelly, welcomes volunteers of all ages to help to record for the census.

The group meets at the Clermiston Road North car park at 9.00 am on every other Saturday morning. The dates are: -

## Activity in the Garden

BTCV (British Trust for Conservation Volunteers) Scotland is an environmental charity that works with volunteers to change their local environment for the better. In the last year in Edinburgh, BTCV Scotland carried out 2096 volunteer days with 1043 volunteers. This work was carried out throughout Edinburgh and the surrounding area. The projects that were carried out included the creation of a primary school wildlife garden, the planting of many thousands of trees, plants and bulbs throughout the area and the ongoing management of many areas of environmental significance and beauty.

At the Corstorphine Walled Garden, BTCV Scotland are creating a wetland area which will extend the biodiversity value of the site by offering a damp and boggy habitat which will support plant and insect species currently not represented. When completed, the area will consist of a 70 metre stretch of boardwalk and bridge surrounding and crossing a boggy area which will support plant species not seen in the walled garden. As the site is not particularly boggy at present, this will be achieved by laying out a liner which will prevent rain-water from draining away. It is hoped that this part of the garden will add interest to an already beautiful and successful restoration project.

The Friends are planning more guided walks but dates have not been established at the time of going to press. Look out for notices on the Hill notice boards and for updates posted on the web site if arranged before the next newsletter is published.

## Bird Watch



Apologies to any members who went looking for white kestrels on the hill after reading the last newsletter. The list of birds spotted in the walled garden should have been "while kestrels can be seen flying overhead".

Recently buzzards have been flying overhead and perching in trees close to the garden. Chiffchaffs can be heard in the gardens in April, May and June. Their call is a repetitive "chiff chaff". Another summer visitor, the blackcap, can sometimes be heard and seen close by. The male has a black cap and the female a chestnut brown one. Other birds which can be seen in the area around the garden at anytime are tree creepers, green and great spotted woodpeckers, long tailed tits, bullfinches, greenfinches and the tiny goldcrests.
